Determining a Need for Transportation			
Student Residency Questionnaire & Educational Rights of Homeless Children and Youths	As outlined in the ESEA Consolidated Plan, WHCS is required to utilize the Student Residency Questionnaire and Educational Rights of Homeless Children and Youths in the State of New Mexico. Identification & Eligibility Interview Questions & Checklist	McKinney-Vento Homeless Liaisons may utilize this checklist to help guide a conversation with the parent, guardian, caregiver, or student to determine if the student's living situation is considered fixed, regular, and adequate, as well as identify what their needs are.
Best Interest Determination (BID) Form	LEAs must make school placement determinations based on the "best interest" of the HCY and student-centered factors. As a requirement, LEAs are to establish a policy and procedure to make best interest determinations (BID), provide transportation, and manage dispute resolutions to ensure school placement.
	Establishing Transportation
Transportation Best Practice Guidance <u>Document</u>	This document provides guidance and shared best practices to ensure WHCS is arranging transportation so that homeless children and youth participate for the full school day, neither arriving late nor leaving before the school day has ended.
Transportation Request Form	This form can be utilized when transportation is needed within WHCS.
Transportation Agreement Form	Once transportation has been finalized, this sample form may be utilized to establish an agreement between the parent/guardian, student, and WHCS to provide and utilize transportation.
Bus Pass Agreement Form	If transportation will be provided via the provision of bus passes, the form may be utilized to establish an agreement between the parent/guardian, student, and LEA to provide and utilize transportation.
Transportation Non-Usage Notification Letter Samples Occurrence Letter	In the event of transportation non-usage or inconsistent usage, form will be utilized to notify and request communication from the parent or guardian to improve transportation usage and school attendance.

Transportation Action Planning Tool	This tool is intended to serve as a self-assessment and guide to support the McKinney-Vento Homeless Liaison, Foster Care Point of Contact, and other pertinent LEA stakeholders develop a comprehensive transportation procedure. Please note that this tool does not serve as the LEA's transportation procedure. It is designed to support with quickly identifying and prioritizing areas where greater capacity is needed to carry out the law.
McKinney-Vento Homeless Assistance Act Statute 42 U.S.C. CHAPTER 119, SUBCHAPTER VI, Part B: Education for Homeless Children and Youths	The McKinney-Vento Act strongly emphasizes the importance of school stability for homeless children and youths. Changing schools' multiple times significantly impedes a student's academic and social growth. Therefore, the McKinney-Vento Act calls for LEAs to maintain students in their school of origin to promote school stability and greater educational outcomes overall, unless it is not in the student's best interest.
Education for Homeless Children and Youths Program Non-Regulatory Guidance	This revised non-regulatory guidance for the McKinney-Vento program replaces the July 2004 guidance and includes new questions that reflect both the amendments to the McKinney Vento Act made by the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA), which took effect on October 1, 2016 and new technical assistance on promising practices for implementing homeless education requirements at the State and local levels. The guidance describes the requirements of the new statute and provides recommendations for addressing many of those requirements.
NM ESSA State Plan	Section 8302 of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965 (ESEA), as amended by the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA), requires the Secretary to establish procedures and criteria under which, after consultation with the Governor, a State educational agency (SEA) may submit a consolidated State plan designed to simplify the application requirements and reduce burden for SEAs. ESEA section 8302 also requires the Secretary to establish the descriptions, information, assurances, and other material required to be included in a consolidated State plan.
